

Celiac Disease Clinical Gastroenterology

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Definition: Celiac disease (CD) is a chronic, multiple-organ autoimmune disease that affects the small intestine in genetically predisposed children and adults. It is precipitated by the ingestion of gluten-containing foods [3]. It may also be referred to as celiac sprue, gluten-sensitive enteropathy, or nontropical sprue.

The diagnosis of celiac disease requires several steps: the patient, while eating gluten, contacts their health care provider; the clinician has the diagnostic consideration of celiac disease; serologic testing is ordered, most appropriately a tissue transglutaminase IgA antibody (tTG IgA), often combined with or followed by an anti-endomysium IgA antibody, particularly in children; and, if serologic testing is positive, an endoscopic duodenal biopsy is performed.

The clinical presentation of celiac disease varies widely, and the onset of the disease or symptoms may occur at any time in life. Many patients with celiac disease have few gastrointestinal symptoms or present with extraintestinal manifestations, while a minority of patients have malabsorption (classic celiac disease).

Celiac disease can present with many symptoms, including typical gastrointestinal symptoms (e.g., diarrhea, steatorrhea, weight loss, bloating, flatulence, abdominal pain) and also non-gastrointestinal abnormalities (e.g., abnormal liver function tests, iron deficiency anemia, bone disease, skin disorders, and many other protean manifestations).
