Block Chords. The most obvious place to start, when composing chord progressions, is with block triad chords. It might be a basic approach to harmony, but plenty of hit songs have chords arranged like this. Triads are created with the root, 3rd and 5th intervals.

Another helpful tool when learning how to write chord progressions is the circle of fifths. The circle of fifths is a visualization of the relationships between certain notes and chords built from those notes. In the circle, each note is neighbors with it ' s 5th (clockwise in the circle) and its 4th (counterclockwise).

Chord progressions are written with roman numerals called the Nashville numbering system. The system notes the scale degree on which a chord is created. The I is the root, the IV is the fourth note in a scale, and V represents the fifth note in a scale. The progression acts as a template and lets the musician or songwriter create a rhythm.
