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Sociology of language, in contrast, is the study of the relations between language and society. Although both

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these fields study the interaction between language and society, sociolinguistics focuses on language while sociology of language focuses on society. In general, sociolinguistics looks at how social factors affect language whereas the sociology of language looks at the relationship between society and language.

Accordingly, we study the language of a particular community with the aim of discovering and understanding the use of the social structures and the way the people of this community use them to communicate properly.
